

LOOKING AHEAD: OVERVIEW OF THE UPCOMING 1987-89 BIENNIUM

Dear Brothers:

First, allow me to thank everyone for the opportunity to continue to serve this great fraternity as your Grand President for the upcoming 1987-89 biennium.

Our Grand Chapter, as you shall see in this issue of The DELTASIG, proved to be our biggest and best to date! On behalf of your Board of Directors, I would like to thank those Congress delegates and participants for their thoughtful insight, hard work and dedication in approving the major constitutional packages put before them! We appreciate your overwhelming confidence and support in our actions and deeds.

This biennium shall be an extremely exciting one! Much of the program development begun in the past biennium shall now carry forward and, hopefully, be implemented in this biennium. Major emphasis shall be in the areas of alumni programming, educational training and professional fraternity development. Allow me to highlight each area briefly.

In the area of alumni programs, exciting times are upon us! We have reinstated and budgeted for our long absent Alumni Newsletter. Although initial mailings will be limited to our alumni and collegiate chapters, we hope to expand this newsletter service to all our alumni as funding becomes available. Our new Vice President for Alumni Benefits and Services (formerly the Director of Alumni Activities and now constitutionally renamed at this convention) has been energized and empowered by the Grand Chapter to further stimulate the interest and involvement of not only our "immediate" alumni chapters and members, but our 93,000 alumni across the country! This is a challenge that will require the support of everyone!

On the front of educational development, our attention focuses not only on our upcoming fall, 1988, regional conferences, but also on our new Provincial Leadership Schools to be held in July/August, 1988. These schools are aimed at training the lead-

ership skills and enhancing the abilities of our national and chapter officers. The program, initiated two years ago on the regional level, has expanded now to the provincial level and will be managed by the four Provincial Vice Presidents. Seventy per cent of all our national officers attended the leadership school two years ago. Our goal is 100% attendance this biennium! We encourage and anticipate involvement and support in this program from corporate America. Perhaps your firm may be interested in contributing its time or talents!

Our final major thrust this biennium is in the area of professional fraternity development. Begun last biennium, our fraternity's goal is to expand its involvement and affiliation with corproate America as it relates to the endowment of our educational programs, internships, scholarships, financial support, participation in speakers bureaus, and a greater interaction with our chapters. Once again, the support and participation of our 93,000 plus alumni shall be instrumental in making this campaign a success this biennium.

Participating hand-in-hand and assuming a greater role in implementing many of these programs will be our Educational Foundation, under the guidance of its new president, James L. Prescott.

In conclusion, Brothers, we are embarking on a very meaningful and ambitious program this biennium. To our alumni members: Please be prepared to give your utmost time, support and attention in helping to achieve and perpetuate our goals and objectives in this great fraternity.

CHANGING FACES

his year not only marks the 80th Anniversary of Delta Sigma Pi, but it also marks the 75th Anniversary of the fraternity's official magazine, The DELTASIG. To celebrate this anniversary, The DELTASIG has taken on a new look, one we hope you will enjoy.

Gone is the Ronda typestyle which has been used on the cover and throughout the magazine since 1974. Replacing it is the Bookman typestyle which will be used on the cover and at other places in the magazine. The title page has been redesigned, as well as the titles for the departments and features.

We think that the changes make The DELTASIG a more attractive, readable publication. Hopefully, you will like the new look to the extent that you will feel inclined to continue to send us personal news, professional articles and other material that will make interesting reading.

Just as The DELTASIG has been redesigned this year, so has it gone through numerous changes in style, content and design over the years since it was first published. Beginning in 1907, and for several years thereafter, Delta Sigma Pi was simply a one-chapter fraternity with the only record of its activities consisting of the minutes of its meetings. As the fraternity began to initiate and graduate more men from New York University, the early members of Delta Sigma Pi began writing a confidential newsletter for distribution to them. This

confidential newsletter, with existing copies dating back to early 1911, was the fore-runner of The DELTASIG.

In early 1912, the first issues of the fraternity's official publication were published. This publication, which was at first published every other Wednesday, was known as "The DELTYSIG." Later in 1912, the name was changed to DELTASIG" and has been the official publication ever since. While The DELTASIG is now published four times a year, in its early years it was not published on a regular basis. In fact, the early editors acknowledged this by heading each copy of the publication with: "The DELTASIG, Published Every Once In A While".

During the first two years of The DELTASIG, all of its editors were from Alpha Chapter at New York University. In fact, the first issues of the publication were a group effort among: John B. (Jack) Guernsey; John A. (Jack) Waldron; Nicholas A. (Nat) Schoenbucher; Frederick A. (Freddie) Smith; John J. (Jack) Burke; and Philip J. Warner. These Brothers wrote about non-secret activities of the fraternity, new positions and promotions received by alumni and lightheartedly mourned the "passing" of a Brother who got married.

One passage in the September 7, 1912, issue of The DELTASIG written by Jack Guernsey particularly illustrates the fraternity's good natured competition with marriage for the time of the Brothers:

The Deltasig Magazine, like the Fraternity itself, continues to evolve . . .

"FIRST ACT: Benson (Philip A.) popular with all and a good fellow."

"TIME BETWEEN FIRST AND SECOND ACT" Several months. Enters a fair shadow in the form of a girl." "SECOND ACT: Benson marries the heroine."

"THIRD ACT: Benson forgets the 'Bunch' and is correspondingly almost forgotten by them. EXIT."

"Why, of you married men, cannot you spend an evening once or twice a month and join the boys around the crackling log fire at the House? Can't marriage and fraternalism live together? Give the girl a square deal. Give her an evening of peace once in a while. She'll like you better for it."

The DELTASIG also contained informative and entertaining bits of news about alumni. In the July 24, 1913, issue, Jack Guernsey writes about founder Henry Albert Tienken who had moved to South America shortly after graduation: "News from South America is to the effect that Bert Tienken of more than local fame is piling up the filthy gold at the rate of several thousand a year and, unlike the rest of us, is saving it. The principal reason seems to be that he cannot find any way to spend it down there. Bert plans to come back to the States soon, retire from active business and devote his time to the management of his estate."

In addition, early issues of The DELTASIG contained information about the Brothers that could not be categorized. During the summer of 1913 many of the Brothers spent a lot of time at a residence they called "Goodfellowship Cottage" at Sea Gate, New York, near the beach. This particular passage, written by Jack Guernsey in the August 23, 1913, issue, illustrates the fun enjoyed by "the boys" that summer:

"The original September Morn, or rather two of them, has or have been discovered! Last Friday about one-thirty, while three of the boys



were sitting quietly on the porch enjoying a night-cap, and the moon was up and the tide was out and the beach was deserted for the hay, THEY appeared. They didn't know they were being observed, for folks are supposed to be in bed and asleep at onethirty. Wrapped in bathrobes they stole upon the beach, glanced quickly about to see that no one was near, then slipped quietly into the welcoming waters. It should be stated for clearness that they left their bathrobes on the beach. That's why there appeared to the pleasantly astonished three on the porch, a little later, a beautiful vision of a September Morn, only twins. And before the aforementioned astonished three could recover their equilibrium or remark upon the beauties of nature the beauties were gone."

"Tickets are now on sale and reservations are being made for seats on the porch for next Friday night, August 29, at one-thirty o'clock. Inquire of the entertainment committee or of the Comstock society, New York."

Throughout the years, The DELTASIG chronicled the history of the fraternity and itself. Early highlights included: the first mention of an alumni group, the "Graduate Chapter" (March 7, 1914, issue), the addition of Beta Chapter (June 13, 1914, issue); the need for a Chicago editor/correspondent (September 19, 1914, issue); the first Chicago editor/ correspondent (November 2, 1914); the establishment of Gamma Chapter at Boston University (August 16, 1916, issue); first mention of the seal of the fraternity, design credited to Harry Cox (September 5, 1916, issue); and the first issue of The DELTASIG printed, rather than mimeographed, on a regular basis (August 28, 1917).

These early highlights and other news and information were compiled by a number of different editors during the first years of The DELTASIG. The first issues of The DELTASIG were published by editors from Alpha Chapter who were later joined by editors in Chicago (Beta Chapter) and Boston (Gamma Chapter).

For several years this situation worked well until the fraternity exper-

ienced a tremendous growth during the years 1920-1924. During this time the fraternity grew from three chapters to 32 under the leadership of Grand President H. G. Wright. It was also during this time at the fifth Congress of Chapters (Grand Chapter Congress) in 1920 that the fraternity saw the need to publish The DELTASIG on a regular basis.

The 1924 Congress of Chapters held in New York City was the meeting at which The Central Office was created as well as the position of Secretary-Treasurer (Executive Director). H. G. Wright was elected unanimously to the position for what was



to be a continuous term of 31 years. During this time he became the permanent editor of The DELTASIG, the fraternity's magazine, which had become a quarterly publication. Regular feature articles were instituted along with departments containing chapter and alumni news.

From 1924 until 1942, The DELTASIG had several design changes, but the content remained consistent, including articles of a professional nature, along with fraternity, chapter and alumni news. In 1942, however, due to the growing number of Deltasigs joining the armed forces during World War II, The DELTASIG again began containing lists of Deltasigs in the armed service as it had before in 1918.

During World War II, only 11

chapters remained active. Along with the decline in the number of active chapters came a decline in income. Because of this decline in income, it was seriously considered that The Central Office cease operations until after the war. It was decided, however, that The Central Office remain open and attempt to provide as many services as possible, including publication of The DELTASIG. This service was continued until January, 1943, when over 4,000 Deltasigs were serving in the armed forces making it impossible to maintain enough correct addresses.

After the war, The DELTASIG resumed publication with the November, 1946, issue. By this time, though, the fraternity had also hired an Assistant Grand Secretary-Treasurer, James D. Thomson, who also

served as the first Assistant Editor. The DELTASIG resumed publication on a quarterly basis and contained many of the same type of features and departments that appear today.


Since 1946, The DELTASIG has been edited by several editors and assistant editors who, usually, have also served in the paid staff positions of Executive Director and Assistant Executive Director. Since that time there have been sev-

eral redesigns of The DELTASIG, the last coming in 1974.

These changes have been made in an attempt to make The DELTASIG a more attractive, more readable, professional looking publication. The DELTASIG is now mailed to over 32,000 collegiate and alumni members, deans, businesses, libraries and other fraternities in this country and around the world. The DELTASIG is your fraternity's magazine and we want it to contain the types of items you are interested in reading. We hope you enjoy receiving The DELTASIG and reading about Delta Sigma Pi as the magazine begins publication for its 76th year.



he beautiful and international Crescent City of New Orleans was the host of the 36th Grand Chapter Congress held at The Fairmont Hotel from August 16–21, 1987. A new attendance record was set as a total of 888 members, spouses and guests participated in

this Grand Chapter Congress. This convention also celebrated the 80th Anniversary of the founding of Delta Sigma Pi. Fraternalism was high as first-time convention participants formed many new friendships with Deltasigs from across the nation while frequent convention attendees


renewed those relationships which had been developed over many years. For the first time ever, the Grand Chapter Congress was extended to five and a half days in length making the 36th Grand Chapter Congress not only the largest, but the longest in Delta Sigma Pi history.

Most attendees arrived on Sunday, August 16, as registration began late that morning and continued throughout the day. That evening, all participants had the opportunity to meet the national officers and staff during the Grand President's Reception and Dance. This particular Dance had a Mardi Gras theme and many participants came dressed in Mardi Gras costumes.

The Opening Business Session of the 36th Grand Chapter Congress began the morning of August 17.

Nominations for positions on the Board of Directors were presented throughout the convention.

Prior to the Opening Business Session, a Delegate Orientation was held for the very first time. Following the Invocation, delivered by Past Grand President M. John Marko, Grand President John V. Henik welcomed the delegates and other participants to New Orleans and to the convention. He then introduced the Board of Directors, members of the Golden Council (past national officers and Central Office staff members), members of the Order of the Golden Helmet and the District Directors. Special convention participants also introduced were representatives from the fraternity's colony at the University of Pennsylvania. Executive Director Michael J. Mazur, Jr. introduced the members of The Central Office Executive staff including Assistant Executive Director Michael T. Walsh, Director of Chapter Services C. Dean

Ferguson and Chapter Consultants B. Todd Whisenant and Robby L. Hultz.

South Pacific Regional Director William R. Kinsella served as Parliamentarian and District Director Michael W. Moegenburg served as Chancellor. Mike Mazur and Mike Walsh served as Secretary and Assistant Secretary of the convention. Brother Mazur then called the Roll of the Grand Chapter representing delegates of the collegiate and alumni chapters. Monday afternoon, each of the regions conducted meetings covering topics of interest to each particular region. Monday evening was free for the participants to enjoy New Orleans. Also during Monday, spouses, guests and several alumni participated in a tour of New Orleans.

On Tuesday morning, the Delta Sigma Pi Educational Foundation

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Breakfast and Meeting took place prior to a morning legislative session. A record 71 legislative proposals were considered during the Grand Chapter Congress.

In addition to legislation, Executive Director Michael J. Mazur, Jr., introduced Keynote Speaker Ed King, Dean of Residential Life and Student Judicial System at Bradley University in Peoria, Illinois. The report of the Committee on Nominations was presented and additional nominations were accepted for national office.

The Awards Luncheon was held on Tuesday afternoon. Chapter Efficiency Index Honor Roll Certificates were presented to 12 collegiate chapters by John V. Henik, assisted by Dean Ferguson. A special highlight was the presentation to Alpha Beta Chapter at the University of Missouri-Columbia in recognition of 47 consecutive years of 100,000 points CEI achievement. Midwestern Regional Director Marlow Kee was presented with a special award for having the region with the highest average in the 1986-87 Chapter Efficiency Index. The chapters in the Midwestern Region achieved an average of 87,408 points.

East Central Regional Director Samuel F. Shaheen then announced that Dr. Joseph Schenk had been selected as the National Chapter Advisor of the Year Award recipient. Brother Schenk is the Chapter Advisor to Epsilon Tau Chapter at the University of Dayton and, since he could not be

present, Epsilon Tau Chapter President Mary E. Slater accepted this award for him. South Pacific Regional Director William R. Kinsella then presented the District Director of the Year Award to Paul J. P. Garcia in recognition of his outstanding service as a District Director during the 1986–87 year.



Participation during the seminars and workshops was high.

Epsilon Chapter at the University of Iowa in Iowa City, Iowa, was presented with the Most Improved Chapter Award by North Central Regional Director Marvin M. Anderson. William R. Kinsella then returned to the podium to present the collegiate chapter National Commu-

nity Service Award to Iota Pi Chapter at San Diego State University.

The program then turned toward alumni awards as Director of Alumni Activities Joe S. Loomis presented the Outstanding Alumni Chapter Award to the Twin-Cities (Minneapolis-St. Paul) Alumni Chapter.

The final chapter award was the Most Oustanding Chapter Award which was presented by Midwestern Regional Director Marlow B. Kee to Iota Nu Chapter at Northeast Missouri State University. Immediately following this presentation, the Most Improved Region Award was announced as the Western Region with Claire S. Roberts serving as Regional Director.

Collegian of the Year-1987 William E. Newburry addressed the Awards Luncheon attendees after presenta-

tion of a plaque in recognition of his selection to this office.

Following the Awards Luncheon, Educational Seminars were scheduled for the remainder of the afternoon with over 20 different seminars being presented. Also presented on Tuesday afternoon was the National Officers' Information Seminar which provided information for individuals interested in seeking national office in the fraternity.

One of the highlights of the convention on Tuesday evening was the

Mardi Gras Parade down Canal Street. Over 600 parade participants gathered in the Ballroom at The Fairmont Hotel to get in a festive mood with the band that was to lead them. After leaving the hotel, the parade, led by Grand President Henik, his wife, Annette and the band, was escorted up Canal Street by the New Orleans Police Department. At the end of the parade, most of the participants boarded the Creole Queen Riverboat for a Dinner Cruise on the Mississippi River. After a night of dinner, dancing and partying, the Deltasigs were bussed back to The Fairmont Hotel where they continued the festivites into the night.

On Wednesday, August 19, the legislative business session continued with the delegates considering amendments to the Laws of the fraternity. Final nominations for elected office were also accepted.

On Wednesday afternoon, additional Educational Seminars were scheduled for alumni and collegiate members. Also scheduled on Wednesday was an enjoyable tour of some old Antebellum Mansions in and around New Orleans. This tour was scheduled as an optional event for spouses, guests and alumni. Another free evening was planned on Wednesday for the enjoyment of the city of New Orleans.

Thursday, August 20, provided opportunities to meet candidates for elected office on a fraternity-wide, provincial and regional levels. The various caucuses enabled delegates to learn more about the candidates in order to cast votes for the most qualified candidates. The National Meetthe-Candidates Forum was moderated by Past Grand President M. John Marko and the provincial and

Biennial Leaders Elected

he Final Business Session of each Grand Chapter Congress is devoted to the election of the Board of Directors who will lead Delta Sigma Pi for the subsequent biennium. The elections conducted during the 36th Grand Chapter Congress filled the positions of Grand President, Vice President for Alumni Benefits and Services, Provincial Vice Presidents and Regional Directors. In all, 16 Regional Directors, four Provincial Vice Presidents, one Vice President for Alumni Benefits and Services and one Grand President, were elected to serve for the 1987-89 biennium.

The Executive Committee, the basic policy making body of the fraternity, with powers delegated to it by the Board of Directors and the Constitution, was also elected directly by the Grand Chapter. Serving on the Executive Committee for the next two years are Grand President John V. Henik, Past Grand President Richard J. Parnitzke, Vice President for Alumni Benefits and Services Randy L. Hultz, Collegian of the Year-1986 Susan A. Plassmeyer, Collegian of the Year-1987 William E. Newburry, Northern Provincial Vice President Samuel F. Shaheen, Southern Provincial Vice President Charles A. Hazday, Mid-American Provincial Vice President Marlow B. Kee and Western Provincial Vice President William R. Kinsella.

The Board of Directors now consists of those members mentioned above serving on the Executive Committee and Eastern Regional Director Marc A. Robbins, Mideastern Regional Director Michael N. Wilson, East Central Regional Director Thomas C. Bauer, Central Regional Director James P. Higgins, Huron Regional Director Frederick C. Lipsey, South Central Regional Director Connor L. Coward, Southeastern Regional Director Velvet A. Mitchell, South Atlantic Regional Director Heather A. Bailey, Southern Regional Director James F. Pendergrass, Gulf South Regional Director Terrell F. Ford, Great Lakes Regional Director Joseph J. Dabrowski, Midwestern Regional Director Karen A. Winter, Southwestern Regional Director Terry G. Lee, Gulf Western Regional Director Victor A. Re-elected as Grand President for another two-year term and leading the Executive Committee and Board of Directors for the next two years is John V. Henik. Initiated in 1977 by Theta Psi Chapter at Indiana University Northwest in Gary, Indiana, John served as Historian and Vice President for Professional Activities. He has served as a District Director in the East Central Region, as Central Regional Director, Mid-American Provincial Vice President and for the past two years as Grand President. In addition, he has served as Chairman of the Committee on Leadership Development and has participated on other national committees. He is currently affiliated with the Chicago and Dallas Alumni Chapters.

With degrees from Purdue University and Indiana University Northwest, John is self-employed as a consulting structural engineer with offices in Chicago and Dallas. He, his wife Annette and their daughter Jennifer, reside in Skokie, Illinois.

RICHARD J. PARNITZKE

After one term as Grand President, Dick once again assumes the position of Past Grand President for another two years and will serve an additional term as a member of the Executive Committee and Board of Directors. Initiated into Alpha Kappa Chapter at State University of New York-Buffalo in 1971, Dick served as Senior Vice President, Public Relations Director and Advisor. He has served as a member of the Board of Directors and as a Member-At-Large in the Buffalo Alumni Chapter and has also served as District Director from 1974 to 1976. In 1976, Dick was elected to the position of Eastern Regional Director and served in that capacity until 1982 when he was elected as Director of Alumni Activities (Vice President for Alumni Benefits and Services). In 1983, he was elected Grand President and has served as a member of the Board of Directors and Executive Committee since 1977.

Residing in Eggertsville, New York, Dick is employed by the Harrison Radiator Division of the General Motors Corporation. Dick and his wife Jackie have two daughters, Lisa and Kathie. Kathie is an alumnus of Alpha Upsilon Chapter at Miami University in Oxford.

RANDY L. HULTZ

The new Vice President for Alumni Benefits and Services is Randy L. Hultz, a charter member of Iota Nu Chapter at Northeast Missouri State University. Initiated in 1978, Randy served Iota Nu Chapter as Chancellor and President. During that time, the chapter was named the Most Outstanding Chapter.

Following his graduation, Randy served the fraternity as District Director and from 1983 to 1985 as Midwestern Regional Director. In 1985 he was elected Mid-American Provincial Vice President and served in that capacity for two years. He has also chaired the Committee on Leadership Development and has served on several other national committees.

Randy is currently employed by Baird, Kurtz and Dobson, a regional public accounting firm in Springfield, Missouri. Prior to entering the public accounting field, he was an accounting instructor at Southwest Missouri State University.

SUSAN A. PLASSMEYER

Selected as Collegian of the Year-1986, Susan is an alumnus of Iota Nu Chapter at Northeast Missouri State University. banquet conducted the evening of April fourth at the Hyatt Regency Hotel in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

Earlier in the day, the 30 charter members of Lambda Tau Chapter gathered at the Bentley campus for their initiation. The Ritual Team was composed of Deltasigs from the Boston Alumni Chapter, Delta Psi Chapter at Suffolk University, Theta Iota Chapter at the University of Connecticut, and Theta Upsilon Chapter at Siena College. Epsilon Alpha began their pledge education program. The pledge education program was conducted by members of the Boston Alumni Chapter. At the installation banquet, Brothers Ann Baumer, Gayle Younger Gerhardt, James W. H. Gerhardt, Richard A. Steinkrauss, and Elizabeth A. Milik were recognized for their contributions to the success of Nu Epsilon Alpha Fraternity and Lambda Tau Chapter.

Graduate Study Grants for Deltasigs

One-time grants of \$1,500.00 for graduate study are available to Deltasigs who have completed at least 75% of the undergraduate requirements for graduation. An applicant must be an undergraduate brother of the Fraternity who has been a member for at least one year, or an alumni brother, in good standing. Applications are sent to all collegiate and alumni chapters, and Deans of Schools of Business. Currently, only one such grant is awarded each year. This grant is named in recognition of Brother Lester H. White of Alpha Chapter.

Undergraduate Study Grants for Deltasigs

One-time grants of \$500.00 for undergraduate study in the field of business are available to undergraduate Deltasigs in their freshman, sophomore, junior or senior year. An applicant must be an undergraduate brother of the Fraternity in good standing with at least one semester or quarter of college remaining. The grant is based on fraternity service, scholarship and financial need. Currently only one annual grant is available, and is named in recognition of Brother Ben H. Wolfenberger of Beta Upsilon Chapter.

"Sparky" Sparks Collegian of the Year Scholarship

A one-time grant of \$2,500.00 for graduate study is available to the national winner of the Collegian of the Year annual competition. This scholarship must be used no later than five years following completion of the Brother's undergraduate degree. This scholarship is named after Brother Sidney "Sparky" Sparks of Beta Kappa Chapter.

Undergraduate Scholarship for Deltasig Family Members

A four-year, \$1,000.00 per year, scholarship awarded to a son, daughter, grandson, granddaughter, niece, nephew, brother or sister of a Deltasig in good standing. Applications for this scholarship are printed in The DELTASIG Magazine. Up to two such scholarships are awarded each year and are named in memory of Brothers Howard B. Johnson (Kappa Chapter) and Thomas M. Mocella (Beta Chapter).


The Delta Sigma Pi Scholarship Key and Scroll
