Your letter of August 14 is the first information I have received of the change in the administrative setup of the Evening School of Commerce of Georgia Tech, and I would greatly appreciate your securing about ten extra copies of the printed circular you sent to me so that I will have them available to send to the members of our board of directors with a report. I will make to them in this connection.

As far as I can tell, this will not affect Kappa Chapter's status in Delta Sigma Pi at all. I would not worry about the junior-senior college program, for if the situation is as I anticipate it to be, you can still pledge and initiate freshman, and all they will have to do will be to pledge themselves to take the business administration or commerce work. Realizing that the Evening School has given 19 years of helpful service to the people and the business firms of the state of Georgia, and in order to make the school of even greater benefit, the Board of Regents has provided that the University System Evening School be developed into a separate accredited institution. This action places the University System Evening School with the other schools and colleges in the state university system. This step was taken by the Board of Regents following the recommendations of the \$20,000 survey

board, whose membership consisted of nationally prominent educators.

SCOPE ♦ For those ambitious men and women who work during the day and desire to attend classes in the evening, the University System Evening School is recommended by the survey board as the evening institution for training. Work toward four recognized degrees is open to them as well as training in the professional or cultural fields. The schedule of courses is so varied that in working for any one degree the student may elect subjects so as to combine the study of cultural, commercial, and professional subjects to suit his requirements.

LIST OF COURSES ♦ With such a wide range of subjects offered as shown below the student should have no trouble in finding the course preferred. Some of the subjects offered are:

Accounting, advertising, American literature, biology, botany, business law, commercial art, economics, education, English, English literature, finance and investments, French, government,

Greek, history, insurance, journalism, marketing, mathematics, office appliances, philosophy, physics, psychology, public speaking, salesmanship, shorthand, sociology, statistics, transportation.

TEACHER CERTIFICATES ♦ The list of courses shown includes far more than enough courses in education for school teachers in order to become certificated according to the requirements of the State Board of Education.

MASTER OF SCIENCE DEGREE ♦ The work accomplished by the graduates of the school of commerce during the past had much to do with the survey board recommending that the Evening School now offer work leading to the Master of Science in Commerce. This work may be finished for the degree in two years with the student carrying a major and a minor for the required time.

C. P. A. AND C. L. U. TRAINING ♦ In addition to the courses leading to degrees in the arts and sciences and the special subjects in the business and professional fields, work is also offered in preparation for state examination for Certified Public Accountant and the more national scope of the Chartered Life Underwriter.

JUNIOR-SENIOR COLLEGE PROGRAM ♦ In conformity with all other accredited colleges, the University System Evening School has a Junior-Senior College Division, the school giving a diploma upon the completion of 60 semester hours and a degree upon the completion of 120 hours (40 majors). By attending summer sessions the student may enter and receive a bachelor's degree at the end of four years.

CLASS HOURS ♦ Classes meet on Monday, Wednesday and Friday nights. The first period is from 6 to 7:30, the second from 7:30 to 8:15, and the last period from 8:15 to 9:45. *Fall term begins September 29th, 1933.*

THE FACULTY ♦ The University System Evening School faculty is outstanding in personnel. The academic subjects are to be taught by members of the Georgia Tech group, Emory University, Agnes Scott College, and the University of Georgia.

The purely practical subjects will continue under the able direction of those well-known business men of Atlanta who have given so much of their time and effort to the school when it was the Georgia Tech Evening School of Commerce.

EXPENSES ♦ In order that everyone qualified may take advantage of the opportunities offered by the University System Evening School, the tuition for the entire course (two majors and a minor) has been placed at \$20 per quarter, payable upon entry. Special arrangements may be made with the registrar when necessary. The schedule for less than a full course is as follows: one minor, \$7.50; one major, \$10; one major and one minor, \$15.

PLACEMENT BUREAU ♦ As an aid to those students who are not at present employed, the school maintains a placement bureau through which many students have found profitable employment. There is no charge to the student, as the Bureau is simply a part of the enlarged program of school service, especially cooperated through the 300 business houses represented in the big student body.
