

# Retirement: A New Beginning for Richard F. Reicherter

Richard F. Reicherter is serving as an Adjunct Professor in the School of Business at Washburn University. Reicherter is Professor Emeritus from Emporia State University where he taught for 29 years. He is completing his 51st year of teaching at all levels in both teaching and administration in Kansas.

Professor Reicherter is a native of Marshall County and attended country school in the Lillis community. After graduation from Marysville High School, he attended Pittsburg State for one year. He began his teaching career in a country school near Lillis. After two years of teaching in rural schools, he was an elementary principal-teacher at Emmett.

Following  $3\frac{1}{2}$  years in the Army Air Corps, he completed his undergraduate work in economics and business at Washburn University. His advanced degrees are from Columbia University.

He began secondary teaching at St. Marys where he later became principal. As a business teacher at St. Marys High School, Reicherter organized the first chapter of the Future Business Leaders of America in Kansas. He was the Kansas state chairman and was chairman of the board of directors of the national organization in Washington, D.C. At the close of his term on the national board he was given an honorary life membership in the organization.

For 18 summers Reicherter was director of the graduate program in Business and Office Education at The Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C. During the summer of 1984, he was visiting professor at the University of Bethlehem in Israel.

He conducted many workshops and seminars throughout the country including the University of Oregon, Eugene, and Oregon State college, Ashland. At various times he taught in the Evening College at Washburn University. While on sabbatical leave one semester, he taught at Columbia.

Reicherter was very active in the Emporia community and is past president of the board of directors of the Emporia Senior Center and a past director of the center. He was the silver-haired legislator from Lyon County and was director of development for the Kansas Silver-Haired Legislature.

Several years ago at homecoming, the ESU Blue Key Chapter which Reicherter started in May 1961, honored him with a permanently endowed Richard F. Reicherter Blue Key National Honor Fraternity Scholarship. Two scholarships are awarded yearly. Several years ago the national headquarters

of Blue Key was moved from New Orleans to Emporia, where Reicherter is chief executive officer of the fraternity. He plans to maintain this position, which includes considerable travel.

His colleagues in the school of business honored him at a luncheon and gave him a retirement gift. A speaker said that Reicherter's professional life had followed John Wesley's famous rule for living: "Do all the good you can, To all the people you can, At all the time you can, As long as ever you can."

He is a member of the Marysville High School class of 1938 and served as president of the Marysville Alumni Association for seven years. In addition to serving as National President and Chief Executive Officer of Blue Key National Honor Fraternity, he is advisor to the Blue Key chapter and Delta Sigma Pi Business Fraternity at Washburn University.

History of Washburn University Topeka Kansas

#### HISTORY OF WASHBURN

Washburn is one of the numerous American colleges of Congregational origin. In the spring of 1857, only three years after the settlement of Topeka, the General Association of Congregational Ministers and Churches of Kansas voted to investigate the possibility of establishing a college in Kansas. Topeka was the final choice.

On February 6, 1865, the state issued a charter to Lincoln College. Classes began in January of 1866. Early announcements emphasize the fact that the quality of instruction was to be equal to that obtainable in the best colleges "at the East."

Lincoln College became Washburn College in November of 1868 in recognition of a gift of \$25,000 by Deacon Ichabod Washburn of Worcester, Massachusetts. Much of the financial support of the institution for many years came from New England philanthropists who were concerned for the advancement of education in this part of the country.

The first building on the present campus, later named Rice Hall in recognition of the untiring labors for Washburn of Harvey D. Rice, was occupied for the first time in the fall of 1874.

Peter MacVicar, one of Washburn's great men, became president in February, 1871, and until June, 1895, guided the institution through critical years of hard times, grasshopper plagues, drouth, and every kind of difficulty, years marked by growth in the face of what must often have seemed unsuperable obstacles. Improvement of the campus, development of a devoted faculty and a sound student body, expansion of course offerings, and financial strengthening of the institution went on in spite of all the difficulties.

The early years of the twentieth century mark a period of expansion. The School of Law was organized in 1903, along with the School of Fine Arts, later called the School of Music and then the departments of music and art. Also in 1903 the Kansas Medical College became the Medical School of Washburn College; it continued until July 1, 1913.


World War I and the postwar period brought many problems and another period of expansion, added to the physical plant, and the endowment funds were, with much difficulty, increased. Then came the depression and drouth years of the '30s; sound management brought the College through this period in better financial condition than many of the other colleges in Kansas, but there was considerable depletion of resources.

Members of the Board of Trustees, unwilling to reduce the assets of the College, offered in the fall of 1940 to turn these assets over to a municipal university if such an institution were approved by the voters of Topeka. In a special election on April 1, 1941, establishment of a municipal university carried by a vote of four to one. Official transfer of the property to Washburn Municipal University was made by court order dated June 13, 1941. The endowment funds of Washburn College are admin-

istered by its Board of Trustees and the net income is transferred each year to the University, which agrees to maintain a liberal arts college with the spirit and tradition of Washburn College. This is being done.

Shortly after 7 p.m. on Wednesday, June 8, 1966, a tornado roared over Burnett's Mound and cut a path of destruction northeastward across Topeka to the municipal airport. Six campus buildings: Rice Hall, MacVicar Chapel, Thomas Women's Gymnasium, Boswell Hall, Crane Observatory, and the Air Force building were damaged beyond repair, as were two sorority houses, Kappa Alpha Theta and Delta Gamma. Nearly every other building on campus except for student housing in the southeast section of the campus was severely damaged. More than six hundred trees were destroyed.

Despite this crushing blow, the work of recovery began at once. The summer session moved to Topeka West High School, where enrollment went on as scheduled on Friday following the Wednesday night disaster. work during an exceedingly busy summer included restoration of the buildings which could be repaired, removal of the wreckage of those which could not be restored, installation of temporary relocatable classroom and office units in clusters to substitute for the lost buildings, provision of temporary accommodations for women's physical education and the physical plant force, cleaning up of an awesome amount of debris, and the beginning of replanting and landscaping. The new and beautiful section of the Memorial Union was ready early in the fall. Work on the new wing of Morgan progressed rapidly. Carnegie, restored, was ready for the Department of Education at the beginning of the second semester of 1966-67. Construction of the Garvey Fine Arts Center was completed in early fall of 1968. A new Law School building was completed in early summer of 1969. Construction on the Learning Resources Center was completed in 1970. Construction of the Mabee Library began during the 1976-77 academic year. An Allied Health Center will complete Washburn's final restoration.



#### Buildings

- The School Law Building provides modern and outstanding accommodations for the students in the school of law. The building was completed in 1969 and includes a library, faculty offices, a courtroom, Law Journal office space, the Legal Clinic, and areas for various activities for law students.
- ◆ The Garvey Fine Arts Center is a wonderful facility for the Departments of Art and Theatre Arts, Philosophy, and Music. The Center was finished and occupied in 1968. The Mulvane Art Museum includes three galleries, a Rare Prints and Drawing Room, painting storage facilities, work room and a Children's Workshop. The museum was a gift by Joab Mulvane in 1925.
- ♦ Stoffer Science Hall contains the departments of Physics and Astronomy, Biology, and Chemistry. The building provides lecture halls and classrooms, offices, an astronomical observatory, a planetarium, display areas, and a spacious lobby. The hall was first occupied in the fall of 1960 and dedicated in 1961 to the memory of Dr. Bryan S. Stoffer, Washburn's president during the two decades of most rapid growth.
- ◆ The Margaret Mulvane Morgan Memorial Building houses the Departments of Mathematics and Statistics, English, Communication Studies and Modern Foreign Languages. The building contains administration and faculty offices, classrooms, and the health center.
- ♦ The Memorial Student Union contains several essential student services. The University Bookstore, Dormitory Board Dining Rooms, Ichabod Inn Restaurant, Facts and Snacks information and snack center, banquet facilities, Breakers food and game parlor, and several meeting rooms all are located within the Union. The Offices of the Washburn University Alumni Association and the Washburn Student Association are also housed in the Memorial Union.
- The Henderson Learning Resources Center is the home of the School of Business, the Departments of History, Mass Media, Political Science, Psychology, Sociology and Social Work. The building is named for John W. Henderson, President of the University from 1965 to 1982 and includes several lecture rooms with video equipment.

- Petro Allied Health Center is the largest building on campus. The School of Nursing, the Department of Health, Physical Education and Dance, the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics, and Physical Therapist degree programs are located inside the Petro Center. The Petro Center has four gymnasiums, a dance facility, a melatorium, and several all purpose rooms. The building also contains a 4,300 seat arena for varsity women's and men's basketball.
- ◆ The Charles Bennett Computer Center was completed in 1988. The building houses the offices for the Computer Information Sciences faculty and the Academic Computer Center.
- ◆ The University Library, Mabee Library, is located in the center of campus. Mabee Library was during the 1977-1978 school year. It has three floors to provide a variety of study environments, from quiet carrels to group study rooms, and stack areas sufficient to hold 300,000 volumes.

## SCHOOL OF BUSINESS WASHBURN UNIVERSITY

The School of Business was established on July 1, 1973, by action of the Board of Regents. The Bachelor of Arts (BA) degree with a major in Economics has been available to Washburn University students since 1904. In 1946, the Bachelor of Business Administration (BBA) degree was created. A Master of Business Administration (MBA) degree program was implemented in 1982. The School of Business administers the Economics major within the BA degree, the BBA, and the MBA degrees.

The role of the School of Business is to provide quality professional instruction in business and economics. This includes study leading to undergraduate and graduate degrees or complementary study for other degree programs.

With a commitment to quality professional instruction in business, the School offers a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in the following major areas of study: Accounting, Economics, Finance, General Business, Management, and Marketing.

The overriding objective of the BBA and the MBA programs is to prepare students to perform successfully in the complex world of business. The academic programs reflect the philosophy that business administration is an integral part of a dynamic economic, social and political environment. Courses offered by the School of Business are designed to develop qualities in students which will help them realize their potential. Emphasis is placed on analytical skills and sound reasoning techniques that are crucial to the decision making process. In addition to developing a perspective of the environment in which business operates, students are encouraged to develop basic knowledge, skills and attributes that are widely transferable and applicable throughout a lifetime of learning on and off the job.

To achieve this objective, the programs in the School of Business offer students a broad educational background by requiring not only business courses but also courses from other disciplines such as English, mathematics, humanities, and the physical and social sciences.

#### The History of Nu Delta Chi

The introduction of Delta Sigma Pi was first introduced to us by Connie Heiland, a student at Washburn University, in February of 1993. Dr. Richard F. Reicherter was also involved with restarting Delta Sigma Pi.

Our first business meeting was held on May 4. All areas of interested business majors attended. During the meeting, officers were formerly elected. The name Nu Delta Chi became our colony name for Delta Sigma Pi at Washburn University.

Business meetings were held in the weeks that followed. Many new students who were interested joined our business fraternity. Throughout the semester, Nu Delta Chi held meetings just for recruiment.

In the summer of 1993, we held several officers meetings. We planned bake sales and other fundraisers that we could have to generate funds for the upcoming semester. Also, we planned all the events for the semester in the Fall.

We had our first guest speaker, Mary Lennart, on October 21. She was very informative and prepared us for what the interviewer looks at when selecting a new employee. Several other guest speakers were scheduled for future dates.
