# HISTORY OF DUQUESNE UNIVERSITY

Duquesne is a moderately-sized, urban, Catholic, co-educational University. Founded in 1873 as a Holy Ghost College, it was chartered as a University in 1911. Since its foundation by the Congregation of the Holy Ghost and the Immaculate Heart of Mary, Duquesne has been under the control of this Congregation, generally known as the Holy Ghost Fathers. Top level administrators are still drawn from members of the Congregation, but actually not more than ten per cent of the total faculty and administration are members of the religious community. Although Duquesne is a church-affiliated institution, it is entirely private in nature and draws no funds from the Catholic Church. By virtue of its relationship to the Church the University does not qualify for support from public funds and is, therefore, almost totally dependent upon tuition and private endowments as sources of financial income. According to its charter, "the oversight and management of Duquesne shall be vested in a Board of eleven Directors." Directors (presently all members of the Congregation of the Holy Ghost) constitute the Trustees of the University. The continuing governing body is the Executive Committee of the Board of Directors. In 1962 a compromise was effected when the President was empowered to organize

his advisory board into a separate corporation known as the Duquesne University Foundation. The civic leaders who compromise the Foundation are all laymen and provide the broad-based, varied experiences usually found among University trustees.

Duquesne University is located in the downtown area of Pittsburgh. The campus is typically urban with all the problems inherent in this kind of setting. The Administration and several other buildings are situated on a high bluff overlooking the Monongahela River. The physical aspect has changed drastically within the past few years as the whole area is part of the Urban Renewal Project for the City of Pittsburgh. Enrollment statistics have shown a slight, steady increase over the past decade. The present figure of 7,114 represents the greatest number of students in the history of the institution.

Duquesne offers programs leading to the Bachelor's Degree in Arts, Sciences, Business Administration, Music, Education, Nursing, and Pharmacy. The Master's Degree is offered in Arts, Sciences, Education, Business Administration, Music, and Pharmacy. The Degree of Juris Doctor is granted in the School of Law, and the Degree of Doctor of Philosophy is granted in some areas of Chemistry, English, Philosophy, and Psychology.





Courses in Business Administration were established by the University in 1913 under the name School of Accounts and Finance. The rapid growth of the School necessitated a constant broadening of the curriculum until it covered all of the business subjects of fundamental importance. In 1931 the School assumed its present name and, with this change, became a professional school of business administration.

In 1928, the degree of Master of Science in Business Administration was first awarded by Duquesne's Graduate Business School. In the fall of 1957, after extensive planning and development, the School inaugurated its current MBA program in the evening division, which was later supplemented with the day MBA program in September, 1965.

Duquesne first extended the Master of Science degree in Economics in June, 1925. The curriculum has since developed and evolved into the M.A. program in Economics first offered through the evening division of the Graduate Business School during the 1961-62 school year. In the fall of 1966, this program will expand into a day-program also.

The School offers the same curriculum in both the day and evening sessions leading to all degrees.

# COURSES OF INSTRUCTION

The School of Business Administration is comprised of three Divisions: Quantitative Science (Accounting, Analytic Methods, Finance); Behavioral Science (Law, Commerce, Management); and Economic Science.

A student entering the School of Business Administration is expected to state to his advisor his career objective along with his academic area of concentration, the latter of which can be several of the junior and senior courses indicated in the three Divisions. student's proposed curriculum must, of course, include the University requirements and Business Administration Core requirements as indicated in the catalog issued for the School of Business Administration. The total of these requirements makes up 88 hours of the 128 hours required for graduation. Consistent with his stated career objective and with the concurrence of his advisor, the student is free to select any junior and senior courses from the School of Business Administration curriculum to complete the 15 hours, plus any nine credits offered by the College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, required for graduation. The single exception to this is the student who selects Accounting as his area of concentration. The regulations for certification in Accounting make this program very rigid. The faculty advisor in the School of Business

Administration plays an extremely important role in
the academic guidance of each student. Because of
this, each student is permitted to select his own advisor based on personal knowledge and available biographical sketches.

#### HISTORY OF DELTA BETA ALPHA

In the fall semester of 1969 a group of interested Business students first explored the possibilities of organizing a professional business fraternity at Duquesne University. There seemed to be sufficient interest among the Business students to form a professional fraternity. This are se from the fact that the only other business fraternities on campus were honorary, and they were not at all active in professional and social activities.

Delta Sigma Pi was recommended by the Dean of the School of Business Administration, James L. Hayes, who is an alumnus of the fraternity. Dean Hayes contacted Delta Sigma Pi's Executive Director, Charles L. Farrar, and communicated the group's interest in forming a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi at Duquesne University. Mr. Farrar and also a local Delta Sigma Pi alumnus, Herb Finney, spoke to the group about the requirements, responsibilities, and benefits of forming a chapter of Delta Sigma Pi. A general meeting of all interested Business students was called at this time, and there was an encouraging turnout. At this point the local fraternity, Delta Beta Alpha, came into existence as a formal organization. Since the formation of this fraternity, an extensive program of business activities coupled with a limited social calendar has been initiated.
