History

The George Washington University had its beginning in 1821 as The Columbian College in the District of Columbia. The name of the institution was changed in 1873 to Columbian University and in 1904 to The George Washington University. The debt of the University to George Washington, whose name it bears, is an intangible one.

George Washington, as president and as private citizen, had urgently insisted upon the establishment of a national university in the federal city. There he hoped that, while being instructed in the arts and sciences, students from all parts of the country would acquire the habits of good citizenship, throwing off local prejudices and gaining at first hand a knowledge of the practice, as well as the theory, of republican government. To further the materialization of his hopes, Washington left a bequest of 50 shares of The Potomac Company "towards the endowment of a University to be established within the limits of the District of Columbia, under the auspices of the General Government, if that government should incline to extend a fostering hand towards it." The Congress never extended a "fostering hand." The Potomac Company passed out of existence, and Washington's bequest became worthless.

Fully conscious of Washington's hopes, but motivated primarily by a great missionary urge and the need for a learned clergy, a group of dedicated ministers and laymen sponsored a movement for the establishment of a college in the District of Columbia. Inspired largely by the zeal and energy of the **Reverend Luther Rice**, they raised funds for the purchase of a site and petitioned Congress for a charter. After much delay and amendment, Congress granted a charter, which was approved by President Monroe on February 9, 1821. To safeguard the College's nonsectarian character it provided "That persons of every religious denomination shall be capable of being elected Trustees; nor shall any person, either as President, Professor, Tutor or pupil, be refused admittance into said College, or denied any of the privileges, immunities, or advantages thereof, for or on account of his sentiments in matters of religion."

During the entire time when the institution was known as **Columbian College**, its activities were centered on College Hill, a tract of 46 acres between the present 14th and 15th Streets extending north from Florida Avenue to somewhat beyond Columbia Road. The Medical School was located downtown. For the better part of the Columbian University period, the buildings of the University were situated along H Street between 13th and 15th Streets.

During the last half-century, the University's campus has been developed in that section of the old First Ward familiarly known as Foggy Bottom, between 19th and 24th Streets, south of Pennsylvania Avenue. The area has many reminders of historic interest to the University.

President Monroe, who signed the Charter, lived at 2017 I Street. The first President of the Board of Trustees, the **Reverend Obadiah B. Brown**, was for 50 years the pastor of a church at 19th and I Streets, and Washington selected 23rd and E Streets as the site of the National University he hoped to see established.

Accreditation

The George Washington University is accredited by its regional accrediting agency, the Middle States Association of Colleges and Schools.

The University is on the approved list of the American Association of University Women and is a member of the College Board.

The **Law School** is a charter member of the Association of American Law Schools and is approved by the Section of Legal Education and Admissions to the Bar of the American Bar Association.

The School of Medicine and Health Sciences has had continuous approval by its accrediting body, which is currently the Liaison Committee on Medical Education, sponsored jointly by the American Medical Association and the Association of American Medical Colleges.

The **Elliott School of International Affairs** is accredited by the Association of Professional Schools of International Affairs.

The **Graduate School of Education and Human Development** is a charter member of the American Association of Colleges for Teacher Education and is accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education for its eligible master's and doctoral degree programs; the master's programs in school and community counseling and the doctoral program in counseling are accredited by the Council for the Accreditation of Counseling and Related Educational Programs; the master's program in rehabilitation counseling is accredited by the Council on Rehabilitation Education.

The School of Business and Public Management joined the Council on Graduate Education for Public Administration in 1966. In 1968, the School became a member of the American Assembly of Collegiate School of Business; the Assembly accredited its undergraduate program in 1977 and its master's program in 1982. The programs in accountancy satisfy the educational requirements for the Certified Public Accountant and the Certified Management Accountant professional examinations. The program in health services administration is accredited by the Accrediting Commission on Education for Health Services Administration.

The **Master of Public Administration program** is on the approved list of the National Association of Schools of Public Affairs and Administration.

The **Department of Chemistry** is on the approved list of the American Chemical Society.

The **Department of Music** is an accredited member of the National Association of Schools of Music.

The graduate program in clinical psychology in the **Department of Psychology** is on the approved list of the American Psychological Association.

The graduate program in speech-language pathology and audiology is accredited by the Education and Training Board of the Boards of Examiners in Speech-Language Pathology and Audiology.



History

Organized as the School of Government in 1928, the School of Business and Public Management has been responsible for over half a century for the professional development of individuals assuming leadership roles in society. The School comprises eight departments--Accountancy, Finance, International Business, Management Science, Marketing, Public Administration, Strategic Management and Public Policy, and Tourism and Hospitality Management. The use of a multidisciplinary approach in educational programming helps prepare both the generalist and specialist for professional careers in today's complex, organizational society.

The School of Business and Public Management is a member of the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, and its Bachelor of Business Administration program is accredited by the Assembly.

Mission Statement--We believe that the creation and dissemination of knowledge is essential for effective management. Our mission is to serve current and future leaders, managers, and professionals in the global community by offering superior learning opportunities in business and public management; engaging in research and other scholarly activities to advance management theory and practice; and providing management and professional expertise to business, government, and not-for-profit organizations.

We are guided by our commitment to excellence in teaching and life-long learning; excellence in research and creation of new knowledge; meeting the distinctive needs of both part-time and full-time students; promotion of an entrepreneurial spirit; intellectual and professional development of faculty and staff; diversity in students, faculty, and staff; emphasis on the interaction of public-sector and private-sector organizations; and active engagement in the public discourse about the social and ethical responsibility of business.

School of Business and Public Management

Discussion of Majors and Degrees Offered

The Bachelor's Degrees

The School offers programs leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Accountancy and Bachelor of Business Administration. Programs leading to the degrees of Bachelor of Accountancy and Bachelor of Business Administration include foundation knowledge for business in accounting, behavioral science, economics, mathematics, and statistics. Curricula are designed to provide perspectives on ethical and global issues, the influence of political, social, legal and regulatory, environmental, and technological issues, and the impact of demographic diversity on organizations.

The Bachelor of Business Administration - 120 hour (129 if specialize in 2 areas) degree program that offers general management preparation with an opportunity for specialization in a specific field of business. The program offers students with flexibility to adjust programs to own academic needs and desires in order to pursue career goals. All students take same business core classes but other education and specialization requirements are designed for the student.

A Bachelor of Business Administration student selects a field of concentration from among business economics and public policy, finance, human resources management, information systems, international business, marketing, tourism and hospitality management, or, with faculty approval, may choose to structure an individualized field of concentration reflecting the student's specific interests in management.

BUSINESS, ECONOMICS, and PUBLIC POLICY: The student develops understanding and skills for different positions and areas in business and government. Courses include economics, political science, and government/business relations.

FINANCE: The student develops skills necessary to make financial decisions. Focus is on a combination of three areas: 1) money and capital markets (interest rates and banking), 2) investments (stocks, bonds, and derivative contracts), and 3) financial management (capital investment, funding, and dividend decisions). Concentration allows opportunities to work upon graduation in different corporations and financial institutions or graduate work in business, economics, and law.

Human Resources Management: The student develops skills necessary for general management and leadership. Focus is on aspects of employment of human resources in business organizations. Careers could be in areas such as personnel management, employee relations, collective bargaining, or manpower utilization.

Information Systems: The student acquires skills with the use of computers in solving problems. Positions available upon graduation include programmer/analyst and systems designers as well as marketing computer hardware and software and systems consulting and management.

International Business: The student acquires skills for positions in international business, especially in multinational corporations, international banks, and government agencies. It is recommended that courses include two years of foreign language.

Marketing: Skills acquired by the student include an understanding of complex and changing environments and their effects on marketing activities and institutions; including buyer behavior, demand, market segments, and cost volume profit relations of marketing programs; and formulating and implementing comprehensive marketing plans. Choices in careers include advertising account executives, marketing research project managers, retail assistance buyers, and representatives for consumer and industrial products firms.

Tourism and Hospitality Management: The student acquires skills through understanding of tourism and hospitality including communication, transportation linkages, legal and regulatory environment, marketing, management and financial aspects, and operational requirements, with an international emphasis on strategic management and marketing approaches. Two years of a modern foreign language as well as a good understanding of a foreign culture is recommended. There is a work experience requirement in this concentration.

Individualized Field of Concentration: There is a possibility for a student interested in a individualized field consisting of courses across the university. You must have four courses and a field elective. All individual fields must be approved in advance through the business school.

The Bachelor of Accountancy- a 120 credit-hour undergraduate curriculum. The program is focused on preparing students for the Master of Taxation program, and future accountancy graduate work. Course work include accounting and business classes as well as liberal arts classes.

The principal objective of the Bachelor of Accountancy degree is preparation for a professional career in accounting. Professional preparation requires specialization in accounting knowledge as well as a general education in English, humanities, social sciences, mathematics, and sciences. An additional objective is the preparation of students for a fifth-year or Master of Accountancy program that is intended to meet the academic needs of students seeking professional accounting careers in the public or private sector, which demand high entry-level academic achievement.






