SECTION III PEPPERDINE UNIVERSTY

UNIVERSITY HISTORY

Pepperdine University is a private, Christian, liberal arts institution located in the heart of Malibu, California. George Pepperdine founded the school in 1937; he amassed a fortune by turning a \$5 investment into Western Auto Parts Company, which operated more than 590 stores nationwide. George Pepperdine's goals in founding this university were to provide a first class liberal arts education as well as encouraging a Christian lifestyle. It affiliates itself with the Church of Christ and has since developed much of its culture based on its founding Christian principles. Pepperdine students strive to lead a life based on: purpose, service, and leadership. The main campus was originally located in Los Angeles, but was moved to its current location in Malibu in 1972 partly due to the violent LA Watt's riots. Today, there are five satellite campuses located throughout the greater Southern California region.

The Princeton Review has mentioned Pepperdine as "the most beautiful campus" in 2006 and 2007. Also, Pepperdine has been recognized as having "dorms like palaces". Pepperdine is ranked 53rd best undergraduate university in America while its Law School and Business School are ranked 52rd and 82rd respectfully. In addition, Pepperdine University is also ranked as having one of the best international programs of any university throughout the United States.

Today, Pepperdine is home to over 3,400 undergraduates, 4,200 graduate students, and over 600 professors. The Pepperdine mascot is the "Wave" and the school colors are blue and orange. Pepperdine competes in NCAA Division I athletics in the West Coast Conference and is well known for its men's water polo team, tennis teams, volleyball teams, and baseball team. In terms of student government, Pepperdine has the Student Government Association and a Student Programming Board; both strive to adequately represent the needs of the student body while encouraging campus involvement.

Pepperdine has five Greek fraternities and seven sororities: Sigma Phi Epsilon, Alpha Tao Omega, Psi Upsilon, Sigma Chi, Delta Tau Delta, Alpha Phi, Delta Gamma, Delta Delta Delta, Gamma Phi Beta, Kappa Alpha Theta, Pi Beta Phi, and Kappa Kappa Gamma. In addition, Pepperdine currently has one other business fraternity, Alpha Kappa Psi. The university offers numerous clubs and intramural sports for its students, and they also have the option of creating their own club if it isn't already offered. Students not only have many opportunities to be involved at school, but also have great support in their living accommodations as well.

All students are required to live on campus for their first two years of their undergraduate studies. Pepperdine's freshmen dorms are suite style with two people per room, four rooms per suite, and a common living room and bathroom for each suite. Each dorm has two student Residential Advisors and one student Spiritual Life Advisor who leads a weekly bible study group and offers spiritual advice. More than 65% of Pepperdine sophomores study overseas, and

those that decide to stay live in Rockwell Towers. Other housing options for sophomores, juniors, and seniors on campus include Lovernich and Drescher Apartments. Every dorm is segregated by gender and Pepperdine enforces curfew rules in which members of the opposite gender are not allowed in each other's dorms between 1:00AM and 10:00AM every day. Finally, Pepperdine is a dry campus, and no alcohol or alcohol related items are allowed on campus at any time.


As a religious-affiliated school, it is mandatory for all Pepperdine students to complete three religion General Education courses. In addition, it is mandatory for students attend at least fourteen convocations each semester otherwise their grade point averages will be negatively affected. Every Wednesday morning, Pepperdine hosts chapel in the Firestone Fieldhouse in which approximately 1,500 students attend on a weekly basis. Other convocations are put on by the university and student-led organizations and vary widely in religious topics.


Pepperdine is six miles from famous Zuma Beach and twelve miles from Santa Monica. The university is about 20-30 minutes away from Los Angeles and 40 minutes away from LAX. The campus is located on a hillside thus giving most buildings on campus a gorgeous view of the Pacific Ocean. Every year graduation is held on Alumni Park, which overlooks the scenic Pacific Ocean. Student-led organizations also occasionally hold special events at Alumni Park, such as concerts and movie screenings.


Tuition for Pepperdine is priced at \$20,250 per semester for 12-18 units. Each unit is priced at \$1,266. Room and board for the 2011-2012 school year is priced at \$11,844. Pepperdine is organized into eight academic divisions, Business Administration, Communications, Fine Arts, Humanities and Teacher Education, International Studies and Languages, Natural Sciences, and Religion. It currently offers forty majors and thirty-seven minors.


In conclusion, Pepperdine University is a university with a rich history as well as a deep understanding of its identity and culture.

UNIVERSITY ENROLLMENT STATISTICS









INTERNATIONAL PROGRAMS

Aside from the campus' beautiful ocean views, Pepperdine University is also renowned for its study abroad programs. Studying abroad is an integral part of the Pepperdine college experience, and well over 60% of the entire student body participates in at least one overseas program. In 2010, the Institute of International Education ranked Pepperdine as the number one university in the highest percentage of students studying overseas and Princeton Review named Pepperdine University as having the seventh most popular study abroad program in the nation.

Pepperdine University offers six programs during the academic year: Buenos Aires, Argentina; Shanghai, China; London, United Kingdom; Heidelberg, Germany; Florence, Italy, and Lausanne, Switzerland. With the exception of the Buenos Aires program, each program has Pepperdine-owned facilities in which the students reside and take courses at. Buenos Aires is unique due to the fact that it utilizes a home stay program. Students that study abroad in Argentina reside with carefully chosen host families and take courses in a Pepperdine-owned facility.

Classes are taught by visiting Pepperdine faculty members from the Malibu campus, by Pepperdine faculty members that reside in the host country, and by distinguished local professors who have been especially selected to teach the students. One aspect of Pepperdine's study abroad program that differs from other universities is the Educational Field Trips, fondly known as EFTs. Each semester, study abroad participants take an educational field trip as an entire group. The week-long EFT is designed to enhance and enrich the students' study abroad experience, and the locations differ with each program. For example, those in the London Program have their Fall Semester EFT in Greece and their Spring Semester one in Egypt. Those in the Shanghai Program have their Fall Semester EFT in Tibet and their Spring Semester one in Cambodia. In general, the EFT is another way of encouraging study abroad participants to cross boundaries and change lives.


Students can choose to participate in a study abroad program during the duration of an entire academic year, during a semester, or during the summer. During the summer, Pepperdine University offers courses and internships in all of the six academic year locations. Also offered during the summer are special interest programs, which vary on a regular basis. Examples of these special interest programs include: the Fiji Medical Mission Program, the Edinburgh Theatre Program, the Crossing Boundaries Leadership Institute in Lausanne, the Uganda Internship Program, and the Spanish Intensive Program.

While the academic year programs accept students who are of sophomore status and up, the majority of Pepperdine students study abroad during their second year of college. This

creates an interesting dynamic in the Pepperdine community that no other U.S. college experiences. Because the majority of the sophomore class is abroad for an entire academic year, Pepperdine students rarely have the chance to meet those students one class above or below them until their junior and senior year of college. This presents a unique challenge in many campus organizations, including our Pi Sigma Beta colony. Many of our freshmen colony members are preparing to study abroad during this academic year. When they finally come back to the Malibu campus, they will hopefully experience a chapter consisting of new members that they have never interacted with before.

Just like the rest of the Pepperdine community, the majority of the Pi Sigma Beta colony has participated or will participate in a study abroad program. Out of the eleven executive board members, ten have gone on a Pepperdine International Program while the eleventh member is an international student. 100% of our members have some type of international experience, which includes speaking another language, living abroad, or interning abroad.





SECTION IV DIVISION

BUSINESS DIVISION

The undergraduate business program at Seaver College is centered on components beyond the traditional business management models. With an emphasis geared towards promoting personal integrity and fairness whilst pursuing applicable business wisdom, the undergraduate business program truly is a place of higher learning and purpose.

Not only is it a place that breeds great business minds, but also a place that nurtures compassionate hearts filled with justice-driven ambitions. Leadership is not quantifiable because it comes to fruition in many effective ways. While some leadership is evident through keen judgment and intuition regarding financial matters and decisions, other leaders are able to manage hearts and souls of people. Great leaders, distinctly different than great managers, fulfill the expectations of a loyal person in that they inspire trust and engender reverence through amiable characteristics such as loyalty. Servant leadership takes leadership to another level by allowing students to pursue lives of greater purpose and dedicate their working lives to service. This is the ultimate hope of the Pepperdine undergraduate business program at Seaver College.

Now that the objectives on the part of the student are laid out, the responsibilities of educators are just as crucial in allowing students to realize their maximum potential of becoming ethical servant leaders. BEGINNING

After much contemplating, the girls realized that in comparison to their peers affiliated with Delta Sigma Pi on other campuses, their expectations were not met. Not thinking too much about it, they decided to become inactive members the following semester since they believed they could make a difference when they come back from abroad their Junior year. While studying abroad in Shanghai, China, Cherie always wondered what Alpha Kappa Psi would be like when she returned back to the Malibu campus for Junior year. After attending multiple professional, community service and brotherhood events thrown by other chapters of Delta Sigma Pi upon her return to the States, she finally decided that Delta Sigma Pi's core values were more of a match. Cherie spent more time getting to know members of Delta Sigma Pi from other universities and knew that Pepperdine was missing out on this great opportunity; she made it a goal to do whatever it would take to start a chapter on campus.

Not really knowing all the speed bumps that would be in her way, Cherie came in contact with Matt Temple and Rick Boner. First semester of her junior year she picked out a strong team of members to fulfill the duties of the Executive Committee. Afterwards, as a committee we received packages and checklists from Dale Clark. Excited to embark on our journey, we crossed many of the initial requirements off the list until we realized we needed an advisor. Since Delta Sigma Pi would not fall under the Greek System, we contacted the Business Division and were referred to the Inter Club Council on campus. There we got permission and a business teacher to become our advisor. To our dismay, Cherie received a phone call from the Business Division chair who voiced his concern about the addition of Delta Sigma Pi on campus seeing that we have a similar organization Alpha Kappa Psi. After many meetings with different professors from the Business Division, Cherie was finally able to meet with the Business Division chair, Dr. Jere Yates. She worked hard to compile a binder full of recommendation letters, Delta Sigma Pi history and facts, comparison sheets and future goals she had in mind in attempt to convince him. Luckily, Dr. Yates was able to get the business division on board with the idea of having Delta Sigma Pi on campus.

That semester, the executive committee traveled to chapters near by Pepperdine such as LMU and USC to gain a better understanding of Delta Sigma Pi. We knew we wanted a strong foundation and idea of where to head the colony before we invited the rest of the Pepperdine community to join us in our journey. Over Christmas break we finalized recruitment plans and hoped for the best. We decided to name our colony Pi Sigma Beta as an acronym for Pepperdine School of Business. January was the first time we opened up the idea of Delta Sigma Pi to the

Pepperdine community. Between the few members in the Executive Committee we each tabled and recruited potential candidates to join our colony. We hosted a Meet the Colony night the end of January and by the end of April we had 43 members.

This semester we have recruited an additional 13 members to the colony. Delta Sigma Pi has gained a lot of reputation on Pepperdine's campus. We are proud to be working closely with the Malibu community; Business Division and Career Center to not only strengthen our colony members but Pepperdine's community as a whole.

We had the pleasure to have one of our own faculty members come in and speak to our colony for this event. Professor Eric Olson is one of Pepperdine's newest faculty members. Olson recently completed his Ph.D. in economics from the University of Alabama, where he also earned his master's degree in 2005 and graduated magna cum laude in 2004. He has been published in the *Instructor's Manual to Accompany Applied Econometric Time-Series*, with coauthored publications forthcoming in the *Journal of Data Sciences* and the *Oxford Handbook of the Economics of Peace and Conflict*. Professor Olson is currently teaching macroeconomics on campus and a couple of our colony members have taken his class.

The purpose of this event was to have Professor Olson teach our colony about the truth behind the numbers in the US economy. Every single day the media bombards us with information such as: tax raises, social security increases, budget cuts, funds cuts, and increases in unemployment. Often times, people are clueless as to what those numbers actually represent. Professor Olson taught students how to analyze the graphs and understand the real meaning of these numbers that are thrown at them on a day-to-day basis. Event Description:

Since 1890 the Rose Parade has been held on New Year's Day with a grand display of floats, marching bands, and equestrian groups that has since grown to a nationally televised event across America. Each float is painstakingly designed and built months preceding the parade (through community service support) to be judged the night before the event.

Our colony decided to donate our time to help the Sierra Madre Float Association (a nonprofit, all volunteer organization that strives to create a warm and welcoming atmosphere for volunteers of all ages). The theme of their float was "Building Dreams, Friendships and Memories." The project was one of the largest they had ever tackled (33 feet tall, 55 feet long and 22 feet wide) with a grand display of the Mission San Carlos Borromeo led by a burro and cart and decorated by magnificent butterflies. Even the center fountain was pumped (on the day of the parade) with gallons of water to add a life-like flavor to the scene entitled "Sueños de California."

What makes these floats standout from the regular float parade is the material used. As indicated by the title, the "Rose" parade has one stipulation: the floats must be completely decorated with roses and edible decorative materials. This is why during the week leading up to the event volunteers are greatly needed. For the Sierra Madre float in particular, 59 weeks of preparation work was needed leading up to the event. We were put to the task of decorating the 6 massive butterflies (12 wings) that flitted (a mechanism was devised that made these 6 foot wide butterflies flap their wings) around the roof of the Mission structure. Each wing was recorded to take upwards of 40 hours to create and decorate. For hours we followed the intricate lines of the wings and single-handedly glued crushed, dyed lentil seeds onto the frame of the butterfly being sure to find each exposed space, lest the judges should notice some lack of attention to detail on the float. Three differently colored lentils were used as each team applied the glue, attached the

lentils and then went back through with tweezers to individually dislodge that stray yellow piece of lentil that may have ventured into the black frame of the body.

Overall, the event was an awe-inspiring one for many of us who had watched the parade over the years on television. To imagine how much work went into the rest of the float is hard to imagine. Over 100 life-like Mexican tiles were also decorated not to mention the oranges, lemons, limes, and pink grapefruit that were included in the decor. Watching the parade on New Year's day gave us a sense of pride to know that we had worked as a team to help in the production of such a fine piece of art. The float was the winner of the Governor's Trophy "best depiction of life in California" and we are glad to say that we were able to take part in a small piece of floral history!

United Friends is an organization in Thousand Oaks that provides residential housing and care for victims of Cerebral Palsy. Cerebral Palsy affects the brain and nervous system, preventing the individual from having full muscle coordination, impairment of sight, and loss of speech and hearing among many other complications. Together with UCP (United Cerebral Palsy), United Friends' goal is to connect and build friendships with people diagnosed with CP and volunteers dedicated to bettering their lives.

Our colony partnered with the Pepperdine University Volunteer Center to work on location for the day. We brought small plants and pots (with potting soil, etc) as well as arts and crafts to make Valentine's Day cards. Though some of the volunteers were regulars, many of us had never worked with United Friends nor been in contact with CP victims for that matter. We spent the first half of the morning in the kitchen and eating facility where we planted the flowers in small pots; this way the patient could add personal touches to the pot and be able to admire it within the comfort of their own rooms. Seeing as the patients' afflictions ranged from loss of speech to motor movement, many of us aided the men and women (all early to middle-aged) in the process. During the latter part of the morning we moved location to the social building where we continued to make Valentine's Day cards and prepared the potted plants.

The event was an eye opener to many of us who were unaware of the debilitating affects of Cerebral Palsy. Many of us met men and women who touched our hearts with their positive attitudes despite the pain and suffering. What made this event meaningful was that it was not in any way a one-time event. Our colony will continue to build a relationship and work with partnering with this organization as it strives to bring awareness to a chronic condition what affects thousands of people across the country.

Event Description:

TreePeople is an environmental non-profit that "unites the power of trees, people and technology to grow a sustainable future for Los Angeles." Since the 1970's this organization has worked hard to plant trees and create a better atmosphere in the greater LA area. Every week, hundreds of volunteers work in different site locations, planting native trees and protecting natural habitat.

Sigma Beta Pi partnered with the Pepperdine University Green Team to plant trees at the Cold Creek Preserve (Calabasas, CA). 25 Pepperdine volunteers worked around the clock to plant indigenous trees. At the end of the grueling day, we had planted 62 trees (each took up to half of an hour to properly tend to and plant). By breaking off into pairs of three, each group went through the rigorous process that was supervised by the TreePeople staff. First the ground was "shaved" (removing topsoil and weeds) then a three-by-three foot hole was dug, wire meshing was added, as fungus treatment. Once the plant was placed in its hole and covered in soil a small moat was built and we added three full buckets of water to the surrounding soil. Special mulch was added and then a team member would come to inspect each tree.

The colony plans to continue working with TreePeople the next time that a tree planting expedition is happening in our area. While the work was hard and the process very tiring we will forever have a greater appreciation for people who recognize the need to plant and protect trees for the future of our planet.

Eco-Friendly Car Wash Sales

During our first recruitment in the last week of January, our goals were to build a strong membership in our fraternity, as well as securing enough funds to start it. To achieve this goal, we sold car wash tickets to the general student body while also recruiting business majors for our fraternity. Not only did this help us financially, it also established our presence on campus, giving us a chance to find a place with the many student associations at Pepperdine.

Eco Auto Spa is a local business in Malibu that offers eco-friendly car washes. They use steam methods, gently lifting away dirt from the car surface, which then can be removed using microfiber cloth. A normal carwash will use around 60 gallons of water that may include chemicals that are harmful to the environment as well as a car's finish. Eco Auto Spa's steam method uses about 1/3 of a gallon of fresh tap water and uses only biodegradable products, greatly reducing harmful effects to the environment. These qualities greatly influenced our decision during our search for fundraising ideas.

For our fundraiser, we offered each car wash ticket at a discounted price of \$15 for a normal sized vehicle and \$20 for a large vehicle on the date we specified. A ticket lasting the whole of February was sold for \$20, regardless of vehicle size. This price included a quick vacuuming of the interior and a steam wash of the exterior. The deal we made with Eco Auto Spa was to keep \$5 for each car wash ticket we sold. We sold a total of 19 tickets during recruitment week, bringing in a total profit of \$320, keeping \$125 of the profit.

As our first fundraising event as a colony, we faced a number of uncertainties while conducting the fundraiser. When speculating our target amount of tickets to sell, our predictions varied greatly. There was doubt surrounding the likelihood of an average Pepperdine student even having interest in a car wash targeted mostly towards local Malibu residents. After a couple sales, our doubts subsided and we concluded that at least \$100 profit might be realizable. Our initial goal of 30 cars became a more realistic 15 cars as the week went on. We learned that many students at Pepperdine didn't own cars and usually didn't carry cash with them. After the ticket sales were over, we also faced obstacles the day of the car wash. It was rainy and cloudy that day, weather very untypical of the usual Malibu weather. Luckily, we had obtained all the ticket buyers' contact information so we could inform them of a date change. We were also concerned about the logistics of the car wash. We didn't want all the cars to come at once, which would cause delays.

Our rescheduled car wash date was a week after the original date. This was actually beneficial because we had just held our first General Business Meeting with all the new members. This gave the new members a chance to get involved with the car wash and provided a great bonding experience for everyone. Though we had conflicts during our first fundraiser, in the end, it turned out for the better.

Women of Color Fashion Show

Ticket Sales Bubble Milk Tea and Snack Sales

For our second fundraiser, we co-hosted the Women of Color Fashion Show and aided in the sale of tickets for the event.

This was our first fundraiser organized by our fundraising committee. This is our colony's largest committee consisting of 13 people. They held regular meetings to discuss ideas for new fundraisers. The committee decided that selling bubble milk tea at the event would be the most cost effective and appealing item. For an even more cost effective approach, we decided that we would make our own bubble tea drink instead of purchasing from a vendor. TARGET COMPETITION CASE, USC






48th GCC (Grand Chapter Congress) Louisville, KY
